

JOINT CLUB DINNER TO CELEBRATE 100 YEARS OF THE ROTARY FOUNDATION

YEARS OF DOING GOOD IN THE WORLD

On Monday 14th November, 106 people, including 20 members, partners and friends from the Williamstown Club attended a special dinner at the Yarraville Club organized by Rotary Regional Foundation Coordinator PDG Murray Verso.

The purpose of the dinner was to highlight the work of the Foundation and to celebrate its 100 years of "doing good in the world". The eight Clubs represented were from the Chirnside Cluster

(Hoppers Crossing, Laverton- Point Cook, Werribee & Wyndham) and Hobsons Bay Cluster (Altona, Altona City, Williamstown & Yarraville). Sadly, the Point Gellibrand Club was not represented.

The MC was the ever-reliable Peter Shepheard (from Altona) and he began the evening with a hearty roll call of each club. PDG Iven Mackay (Yarraville) gave The Grace by reading out different Rotary Graces from around the world to emphasize the internationality of Rotary. PDG Murray proposed the Toast to Rotary International by giving a brief history of the impact the Rotary Foundation has had around the world – spending 3.4 billion dollars on humanitarian and educational programs, immunizing 2.5 billion children against poliomyelitis and training 1000 Peace Fellows.

Throughout the night there was a rolling slide show of the personalities and activities of each of the eight represented clubs. This generated a lot of interest and occasional mirth amongst the guests.

The highlight of the evening was a panel discussion of Rotary Alumni skilfully led by PDG Julie Mason. The panel was comprised of a former Rotary Peace Fellow, Jessica Trijsburg, a former Rotary Global Scholar, Lien Trinh who is now working with Rotary to eradicate the eye disease trachoma from indigenous communities in Australia and Del King who travelled to India on a Rotary Group Study Exchange and who is now President of the Rotary Club of Flemington. Also on the panel was PDG Dennis Shore who is chairman of the District 9800 Foundation Committee, a former GSE Team Leader and someone who has had extensive experience selecting people to take part in Rotary funded study trips. Under Julie's guidance each panellist outlined how their lives had been influenced and enhanced by Rotary. Their demeanour and insightful comments showed what an inspirational and talented group they were.

With an obligatory Rotary raffle on the night and ticket sales from the large attendance, the dinner raised around \$1500. The money will go to the Rotary Foundation.

The evening concluded with two Rotary Christmas Cakes being used for the singing of Happy Birthday to MC Peter, whose birthday it was, and to the Foundation itself. PDG Ian Knight (Werribee) moved a vote of thanks to interviewer, Julie, panellists Jessica, Lien, Del and Dennis. To MC Peter and to principal organizer Murray.

Some of the feedback received after the dinner included comments such as "a classy event", "great meal", "inspirational young women" and "the best showcase of the Foundation I've ever attended".








NOVEMBER IS FOUNDATION MONTH



I am glad you have looked at pictures of Panda Bears on the internet, they are magnificent and unique animals. I would love to see one up close one day. We have a zoo in Adelaide, South Australia that homes the only 2 Panda Bears in Australia, their names are Wang Wang and Fu Ni. Perhaps David and I might visit them one day, and send pictures to you.

I have attached pictures of our puppy dogs. The first one is Lexi when she was only 10 weeks old – very fluffy, puppy! Ariel, who is chocolate and white, with Lexi sitting outside our back door watching the world go by, and Ariel & Lexi at David's feet tired after their chasing games. The last one is the mischief they get up to when they are chasing each other sliding over our floor, and knocking things over!
