INTERNATIONAL REPORT: Mark [deputy leader] and Asher reported their work with ST JUDES. St Judes have poor internet so no Skype. They are looking at videos as a way of communicating. This was after 8 Sandridge students went to a meeting with representatives from St Judes and were able to meet the principal to set up a program where the two schools could work together.

SOCIAL SERVICE REPORT Marcus the grade 6 leader reported that they are planning many activities this term. They will organise a roster among senior students to ensure that all sporting equipment will be available, collected and distributed to students for lunchtime activities. They are also starting a lunchtime games group for those who prefer indoor activities.

TREASURERS REPORT They have \$1,250 in their account and raised over \$12,000 last year.

It has been a busy time here for us also. We have had a young man named Kengo staying with us from Japan. He is 17 and he has been here for a week studying English.

This morning I took him to join the group of other Japanese students who have been visiting Melbourne as they are returning to Japan tonight after a visit to the Melbourne Zoo.

David, Grandma and I were sorry to have to say goodbye to Kengo he was a delightful guest and we are going to miss him.

I have attached some photos for you. There is a family photo of David, myself, Grandma and Kengo. Kengo with Ariel and Kengo with Lexi, can you see how much Lexi has grown since the last photo I sent you?

We had a family BBQ on Saturday and Kengo was lucky to hold a baby kangaroo which we call a joey. A family friend has a wildlife sanctuary where a baby kangaroo had been brought in for care as she had been separated from her mother. Joey's live in their mother's pouch until they are old enough to fend for themselves. There is a picture of Kengo along the Great Ocean Road which is a spectacular coast line here in Victoria and one of Kengo in a helicopter. There is a famous stretch along the Great Ocean Road of

rock sculpture called "The 12 Apostles" Kengo went up in the helicopter to have a good look at these amazing natural structures.

When Kengo had returned from his helicopter flight, we drove a little further along the coast to a fishing village called Port Campbell where Kengo and I braved the freezing cold water and went for a swim it was very invigorating, however we couldn't stay in the water all that long it was just too cold! We then had fish and chips on the beach and returned home having had a super day!

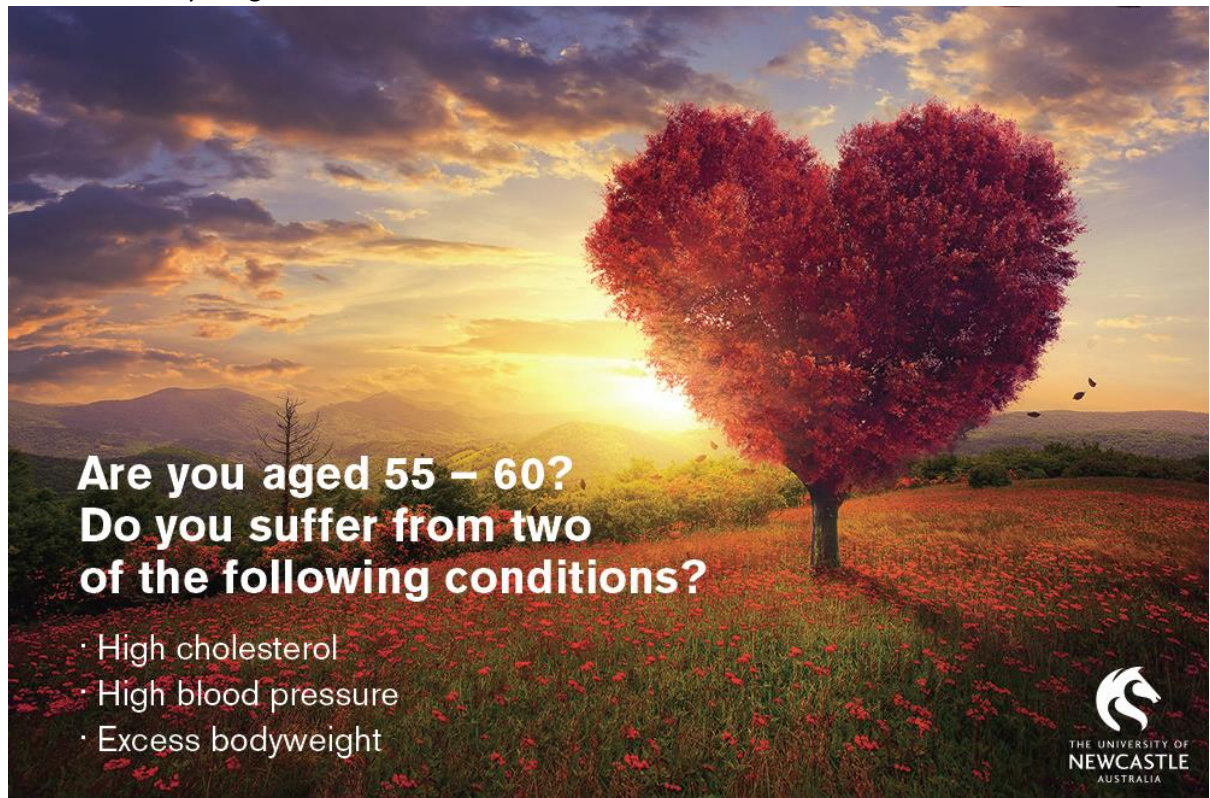
