Info on how/where to donate is coming to all concerned in an email shortly. Murray spoke of the fabulous amount that Rotary has raised in the last 12 months which was \$330,000.

Damien announced a reminder for the Newport Lakes Primary School's PEACE POLE Ceremony on 12 May 2.45-3.15. He has the service program available.

The school cubby house project is all completed and the kids, teachers and parents are all thrilled. A great success. Thanks to all the hands on deck for that.

Nils reminded all that we all must have a "Working with Children" safety clearance. This mainly applies to the newbies who have recently joined.

The Bird Hide which is funded by us has a \$2400 grant. The next stage of the project is on the weekend of 29/30 May.

Discussions and ideas went around the room as ways to attract a younger crowd. Angela along with some other members are working on a promotional and image building advertising concept with the intent to uplift and present the Foundation. Brainstorming is underway. In turn it will both enthuse and appeal to the younger age groups too.

The MEC project was raised and we will be discussing that at our board meeting next week.

The Maclean Reserve playground will be having its parts, structures and other usable facilities sent overseas. The park will then be going under a full and total reconstruction.

It was decided .not to go ahead with the WINDWARD ADVENTURE SAILBOAT. Various issues are lack of transparency and information on drinks, food and outgoings on costs and too many unknowns. Plus the need of 45 people to be found combined with the unpredictability of 'A winter weekday only' availability can be hard to sell. At our next board meeting we will discuss the favourable possibility of sponsoring one child to attend the sail boat experience. This will be \$2500 in sponsoring cost. We have agreed to distributing the flyers to yacht clubs, businesses and other corporates in the area.

WINDWARD BOUND R100 GREAT YOUTH ADVENTURE



- Series of 10 day voyages up the east coast of Australia for youth aged between 14 & 17 years.
- Gives teenagers from a variety of backgrounds the opportunity to learn new skills, build confidence & make new friends.
- Windward Bound will be docked at <u>Seaworks</u> from 28th July to 9th August
- During those dates it is proposed to have 6 day trips morning & afternoon coordinated by Rotary
- Day trips take 45 passengers at a cost of approx \$120/person and Club to supply alcohol
- Income from the day sail shared \$3000 to Windward Trust \$2000 to Rotary

WINDWARD BOUND R100 GREAT YOUTH ADVENTURE

- Sails the Melbourne to Eden Leg 9th August to 18th August
- · Takes 18 teenagers.
- Cost per teenager is \$2500 for the 10 day sail.

ROTARY & PEACE

Launch of Newport Lakes Peace Pole, 12 May 2021

What is Rotary?

Rotary is a global network of volunteers dedicated to tackling humanitarian challenges around the world. The work of our **1.2 million members**, in more **200 countries**, improves lives of people in both local communities and internationally.

The advancement of international understanding, goodwill and peace is enshrined in the constitution of every Rotary Club.

Rotary was founded in Chicago in 1905. It has stood the test of time, remaining relevant and effective.

Rotary came to Australia on **21**st **April 1921**, with the first meeting of the Rotary Club of Melbourne, exactly 100 years ago.

This peace pole is part of our centenary celebrations in Australia. The aim has been to get 100 Rotary Clubs to mark 100 years of Rotary service by distributing at least 100 Peace Poles to schools around the country.

What is peace?

Most people answer this question by saying that peace is the absence of violence, and that is partly correct. But peace is much more than the absence of violence. Peace is about justice for all.

Rotarians carry our education programs and provide humanitarian aid to address the underlying causes of conflict. Our work includes fighting disease, providing clean water and sanitation, improving the health of mothers and children, supporting education, and growing local economies. Last year alone Rotary spent \$362 million on these aid programs.

These programs reduce the risk of conflict by building ideal conditions for peaceful societies.

How has Rotary tried to build peace around the globe?

Here are some examples over the decades.

- In the 1930's Rotary Clubs began running public meetings, bringing together writers, economists, scientists, and politicians to discuss issues affecting world peace.
- In the 1940's, Rotarians were consultants and observers in the process to set up The United Nations and Rotary still has an office at the UN.
- In 1945, The United Nations Universal Declaration for Human Rights was written using a framework developed by Rotary International in 1940.
- **Since the 1950s,** the Rotary has provided scholarships for university graduates to do further studies in another country.

- Since the 1960's, Rotary has sent teenagers to live and study overseas as Youth Exchange students.
- Both these programs promote greater understanding between people of different cultures and nationalities. This is the key to global citizenship and peace. People who understand each other are far less likely to be in conflict.
- In the 1990s, Rotary decided to fund Peace Centres at 8 universities around the world. Since the inaugural class in 2002, more than 1400 Peace Fellows have been trained at these prestigious centres. After studying the causes of conflict and how to resolve it, most of them have gone on to become leaders in government, education, the media and in the provision of humanitarian aid.
- Recently, Rotary entered a partnership with the Institute for Economics and Peace (IEP). IEP is an international think tank that measure peace around the world and promotes the idea that peace is an achievable measure of human well-being. By using various parameters, IEP rates the level of peacefulness in each country each year. Currently, Australia is ranked the 13th most peaceful country in the world. Anyone want to guess which country is the most peaceful?
- And today Rotarians convene peace conferences around the world, bringing together people from different backgrounds to discuss human rights, international relations, global health, and other peace related issues. We held one in Melbourne 3 weeks ago as part of our centenary celebrations.

I hope this brief overview has given you some insight into Rotary's **genuine and meaningful commitment** to peacebuilding and conflict resolution.

Congratulations to Newport Lakes Primary School, its principal, its staff, students, and particularly, the Earlyactors for placing this Peace Pole in the school grounds.

May it stand as a silent sentinel, reminding everyone who sees it to always think and act in the spirit of peace.




